Welcome to issue 42



Now and Then then can you help the Exmoor Society?

Since 1958, the Exmoor Society has collected thousands of 35mm slides and over the past two years they have digitised as many of them as possible. They are a valuable record of Exmoor, showing how the landscape has changed gradually (and not so gradually) over the decades. Those that show people, street scenes and livestock also show social changes, creating a continuing record of the moor, its people, landscape and animals, we are retaking these photographs and noting more precisely when and where they were taken.

The principle is simple – go to the same spot the old photo was taken and retake it. In practice, the Society's archivist has found it isn't always easy to locate the exact same spot! Since we have over 1500 slides depicting locations across the moor, the task is enormous and we are seeking people to get involved and help us retake these historical photographs.

Church Wall ...

The Villainous "Church Wall" - Sounds like fiction but its Fact.

The All Saints Church Wall saga continues for yet another year. 5 years and counting. No work will be done this year and the foot path remains closed despite the best effort of the Town Council and local Church.

DTC and the local All Saints Church have been working together in an attempt to get permission from Diocese of Bath & Wells to carryout remedial work on the dangerous Church Wall running alongside a public footpath.

What's it got to do with me and why should I care, I hear you say - well, due to the Law, the maintenance of the church yard walls falls to the town to pay for the upkeep, meaning you and me are stuck with the bill.

On 1st April 2016 (April Fool's day, we should have taken a hint from the date) the DB&W finally got round to issuing a legal document called a Faculty to the DTC/Church. In our terms a Faculty can be thought of as planning permission. It gave permission for work to start for either of the 2 proposed alternatives (it took 6 months of asking before they got round to send us a copy in September).

Hooray, I hear you say.

But the Diocese of Bath & Wells in September informed us that the legal document they had previously issued was an "administration

previously issued was an "administration error" and enclosing yet another a Faculty dated on April Fools date (1st April) - two legal document issued on the same day? The accompanying letter told us in no uncertain terms that we could not start work using alternative A, but should go ahead with B. The down side was no "builder" was prepared to quote for B. A fact they are aware of

After an email exchange, the Diocese of Bath & Wells finally emailed asking for written proof that your Town Council was unable to get any engineering companies to quote for B, if we did so, they would possible consider changing the Faculty to authorize alternative A.

Are these demands reasonable - only you can decide

... The other Church Wall

If you have had the opportunity to through the church yard recently you may have noticed the wall between the Old School House (on the left) and All Saints Church Yard has fall down in part. This is a "dry" stone wall which nobody can argue about- it is a fascia wall (the opposite to the notorious "Church Wall" which supports 2m of earth) with the stones set into the earth slope.

Just recent the Diocese of Bath & Wells, "Church Wall" saga in another item of news this month's, claim by "the rebuttable presumption that they will belong to the church in the absence of any evidence



to the contrary. Unfortunately this being the case it fails to the town to pay up yet again, however in this case permission has been granted by the local church to go ahead up to a certain cost.

On the plus side we hope not to have to deal with the Diocese of Bath & Wells and can get on as the work has been approved.

Part Two of DULVERTON SCHOOLS

As a youngster, I wasn't privileged to attend Dulverton schools so I am not writing from past experience but from the kindness of past students and staff who studied or otherwise at our schools.

I mentioned Mr Weaver, a headmaster during the Second World War, at the First School, he was followed by Mr G Warner, known as "Plum" he presided between 1952 and '58 with a break by Mr J H Parfitt between 1958 to '61 and Mr Warner reappearing from 1961 to '63.

After that, many of you will remember Mr Higginbottom who came from Lancashire. I remember him slippering my children when they attended the First School.

We leave the First School temporarily to mention the earlier years of the then, Secondary Modern School. built 1957-58 to accommodate children of the Dulverton and District, the children not leaving until they were 16.

The first Headmaster being Mr E Hall followed by Mr W S Clifton for three years and then by Mr M Wood.

1967 came along and the school changed to a Middle School, the Government policy changed and the Somerset County Council

followed by changing the name along with the style of teaching and with age range of pupils from 9 to 13 yrs.

1985 the school was designated for change when the Lib. Dems. strategy altered the system and the school name was altered to Dulverton Middle and Community School. The school had at least 10 staff and the ratio of pupil to staff was about twenty to one. This was the time when adult education took off and many adult classes were formed, as many as 500 adults attending the courses.

2000 saw the famed Exmoor Curriculum launched, a joint effort between the Exmoor National Park and the Middle School to raise the awareness of the countryside and where they lived incorporating the current school curriculum as well.

2005 the SCC funds started to dry up, consequently the school suffered on going cuts and the adult education at the school was withdrawn.

Next time we shall mention members of staff that you all might know, from 1967 on, more on the First School and how the schools then changed up to the present day.
